FACT, Inc. is a premiere preschool provider in South Arkansas. Committed to excellence, the agency provides early childhood education services to children in preparation for success in kindergarten through its 23 preschools and 5 home based programs.

The FACT preschool child development program

offers a wide array of program options to meet family needs. These include:



<u>Head Start (HS) Classroom Services</u> are for children ages 3 to 5 whose family income is less than 100% of the poverty level or who meet federally defined criteria.

<u>Early Head Start (EHS) Classroom Services</u> are for infants and toddlers and pregnant women and teens. If eligible, toddlers may transition from EHS to other preschool programs provided by FACT when space is available.

EHS Home Based Services are for clients who choose to have home educators provide the same services offered by our classrooms in the privacy and comfort of their homes.

<u>Arkansas Better Chance (ABC) & Arkansas Better Chance for School Success (ABCSS) Classroom Services</u> are for children ages 3 to 5, whose family income is less than 200% of the poverty level or who meet specific









Empollment

Children of Hispanic or Latino origin are classified under race as white, so they are not separated in the graph. However, we did serve 44 Hispanic children in HS/EHS, which was 5.7% of the number served. We served 23 Hispanic children in the SW counties, which was 15.3% of the number served.





The average monthly enrollment from Aug. 2022 to May 2023 for Head Start & Early Head Start was 76.1% of the funded enrollment; for the SW counties it was 73.8%. For ABC, it was 81% of the funded enrollment.

FACT served 772 Head Start and Early Head Start children and their families at some point during the 2022-2023 program year.

Of those, 647 were income eligible and 125 were over the poverty guidelines.

An additional 150 children were served in the SW counties grant with 123 income eligible and 27 were over the poverty guidelines.

ABC served 201 children and their families. All met ABC eligibility guidelines.





FACT employed 195 full-time staff, 5 part-time staff, and 1 contract staff in the 8 counties served. The list below indicates employment numbers.




Education

EHS coordinators and classrooms are adjusting and moving along with the implementation of Creative Curriculum, teachers are being encouraged to dive deeper into the curriculum incorporating more Intentional Teaching Cards throughout the day. Many locations were assessed by Better Beginnings utilizing the ITERS-3 assessment tool. All centers observed scored a Level 4 or higher. The Home Educators and Education Coordinators



attended the Partners for Healthy Baby Institute in Orlando, FL to support the implementation of the curriculum currently used to fidelity.



Centers hosted multiple events such as graduation drive through parades, center visits from Santa courtesy of area volunteers, and Grandparents and Veterans Breakfasts. Community members volunteered to read in the classrooms, city librarians visited and encouraged families to apply for a

brary card. Centers also had visits from fire departments who taught safety, sanitation departments discussed how to keep the community clean, and Arkansas Game and Fish offered outdoor demonstrations. On-site school bus safety training was provided.

Head Start and ABC staff collaborated with public school officials to ensure children's Kindergarten Readiness Skills are aligned with Kindergarten

Readiness Goals. Parents received the Kindergarten Readiness Indicator Checklist for Parents. Public school teachers spoke at parent meetings to discuss parent and child expectations for kindergarten.

Field trips were taken to receiving schools for transitioning students. Students are prepared for Kindergarten by using Teaching Strategies Creative Curriculum that aligns with Head Start Early Learning and Outcomes Framework and the Arkansas Child Development and Early Learning Standards. Child Outcomes data is generated three times per year (fall, winter, and spring), shared with families, and assessed for co-planning for in-



Disabilities & Realth

Special Services:

FACT continues to use the Devereux Early Childhood Assessment (DECA) tool to assess all children's social and emotional growth. The DECA is a strength-based assessment that defines a child's resilience and screens for protective factors within a child.

Those protective factors include self-control, initiative, and attachment. It is conducted twice per year—when the child enters the program and a second time in March. Teachers enter the information online where the results are automatically calculated and a report can be generated for use in the classroom and at home. In the event that a child has two or more areas of need, a behavior management plan is created to empower the child's growth in their everyday life, socially and emotionally.

The book *Promoting Resilience for Now and Forever* acts as a resource to help parents understand why social and emotional health is so important and how the most ordinary moments and interactions with their young children are the perfect resilience-building opportunities.

FACT also uses a developmental screener called the Brigance Inventory of Early Development to measure the progress of a child's development from birth through seven. Those areas include physical development, adaptive behavior, language development, and cognitive skills. Screening alone is not enough to identify a developmental concern, but it provides early intervention indicators that support the need to refer a child for more evaluation by a qualified professional. The earlier a possible delay is identified, the earlier we can refer for further evaluation and additional support and services.

As a Head Start program, we must ensure that at least 10 percent of our total funded enrollment is filled by children who are eligible for services. For the 2023-2023 program year, 14% of children enrolled in the agency qualified for disability services. FACT provides services to children who qualify for early intervention ser-



Health Services:


<u>91%</u> of EHS children were up-to-date on a schedule of age-appropriate preventive and primary health care, according to Arkansas's EPSDT schedule for well-child care. <u>83%</u> were up-to-date on Dentals.

92% of HS children & 98% of SW children were up-todate on a schedule of age-appropriate preventive and primary health care, according to Arkansas's EPSDT schedule for well-child care. 82% were up-to-date on Dental of HS children and 88% of HS children in SW.








■ 3 Year Olds ■ 4 Year Olds






HS/EHS/SW BUDGETS



HS/EHS/SW Expenses







Im-Kind






In-Kind is a general requirement of most federal and state grants. To be counted as In-Kind, services or items donated must be those things that the program would have had to pay for otherwise.

Head Start grantees must obtain a 20% In-Kind match for every dollar awarded.

ABC requires a 40% In-Kind match of the grant amount and their match comes



from a variety of sources as indicated in the chart.

Volunteers assist with laundry, art, and festivities throughout the year. Members of the community volunteer their time to speak with parents to share expertise or with the children to give them new experiences and learning opportunities. Businesses and community members also donate items to the classroom that the agency would otherwise have to purchase such as copy paper, masks for the children, and art supplies.

Audits, Reviews, New & Innovations

FACT's annual financial audit was conducted by a team of auditors from Cook & Morehart Certified Public Ac-



countants of Shreveport, Louisiana. It took place February 21 through February 24, 2023 for the fiscal year ending October 31, 2022. There were no findings or questioned costs in any major federal awards program noted in the audit.

Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA)

FACT received an increase in Federal funds of \$488,990 to be used to increase salaries and fringe benefits and to pay for higher operating costs. All Head Start and Early Head Start employees were awarded a 6.5% increase in their rate of pay.

Quality Improvement Funding

FACT received an increase of \$268,845 to be used to improve the quality of the program. The funds were spent to add an additional 1.5% increase to all Head Start and Early Head Start employees rate of pay.

Child and Adult Care Food Program

On November 2, 2023 the Department of Human Services conducted a review of FACT's Child and Adult Care Food Program, CACFP, and there were no findings in the operation of this program.

CLASS Video Pilot


From March 17, 2023 through May 1,2023, the Administration for Children and Families (ACF) conducted a CLASS Video Pilot review of Families and Children Together, Inc. Head Start. The agency scored above the Competitive and Quality Threshold in all domains. The agency scored 6.0417 in Emotional Support, 6.0926 in Classroom Organization, and 3.2593 in the Instructional Support domain.

Parent Involvement & Notables

Parent participation is encouraged to explore new and innovative ways to prevent barriers to parent participation. Parental involvement in school is an important element of a student's success.



- The Grandparent Support Group was originally created by FACT and later a partnership with the SHARE Foundation was to increase participation. Center activities that were geared around grandparents included Breakfast for Grandparents, Grandparents BINGO Night, volunteering in the classroom, reading to the children, and other activities.
- Parents volunteer in the classroom, attend provided trainings to strengthen their role as a parent, complete survey information to assist the agency, participate in home visits, play an active role in transitioning from FACT into kindergarten, participate in Ready Rosie parent education, and learn Conscious Discipline lessons for managing stress.
- When needed, FACT offers Incarcerated Parent activities to maintain a connection through handwritten letters, children's artwork, and helpful information on parenting,

as well as the agency's newsletter- The Grapevine.

• As part of Head Start Father Initiative, FACT provides father-focused involvement activities by an array of activities at the center level including Donuts for Dads, Deck the Halls With Dads, Dads Reading on the Carpet events and activities, volunteering in the classroom, reading to the children, sharing information about their occupation, and others.

Community Assessment

The Community Assessment is a tool to make program decisions, determine the types of services most needed by families and children, to locate resources available for those needs, and to set long- and short-term objectives. Head Start leadership staff study the most important changes in the communities and counties on a regular basis; however, the Community Assessment is performed every five years and updated annually for a more in-depth process.

Economic Outlook

Five counties saw a *decrease* in the rate of unemployment. Lafayette County has the highest rates. Standard Lithium has purchased 118

acres of land in Lafayette County with plans to build the highest capacity lithium extraction plant in Lafayette and Columbia County. Three Dollar General stores opened in El Dorado, Arkansas, located in Union County.

El Dorado Paper Bag Manufacturing Company, located in El Dorado, AR, will close by the end of the year, according to a representative with ProAmPac, the Cincinnati, Ohio-based company that purchased El Dorado

ble. The most current report on demographics was created in 2020-2022 and it provided estimates for our populations. We also looked at the Arkansas Department of Workforce Services, Arkansas Department of Human Services, and the new Aspire Arkansas Project—a new program created to provide life statistics on individual counties in Arkansas.

With the percentage of single parent households and the unemployment rate for

each county that FACT provides services, the agency's preschool programs are essential for furthering the education of our most vulnerable citizens. In addition to providing education to break the cycle of poverty, the full day programs are vital for providing families with time to be in the workforce.
